
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Conversations: Listening Our Way To The Future

For 1500 years, the church was at the very center of western civilization. We were born, lived, and died in Christendom. But today all that is changing. The church's mission as the body of Christ is still what it always was, but the world in which the church finds itself has transformed almost beyond recognition. We seem to be at the dawn of a new Apostolic Age, where we are closer to the church of the earliest Christians than to the church of the 1950's. It's a new world, and that world does not know us.

The Plan



To listen and learn:

Who are we? What do we do

What are the priorities in the community?

How can we better impact the quality of life in our community?

What makes us relevant to the next generation?

Where might there be strategic and programmatic opportunities for mutual ministry?

Before Rev. Sharon left for her

sabbatical, she challenged us to think and talk and listen and pray about how God is calling the members of Trinity to be Christ's body in this new post-Christendom world. While she was away, fifty members of the church took part in Conversations with the Congregation. We shared stories of our lives at Trinity and beyond its walls, of the things we are most proud of in our community. Listening to sermons. Taking part in the fair. Singing Handel's Messiah. Sharing with our neighbors through Trinity's Closet, and helping to found Branford Cares. These are just some of the things that were mentioned.

We are going through all the data now and will report back soon on the patterns and trends that emerged from the conversations.

Our plan is to focus on three groups in discerning how to move forward: our own members, community groups both inside and beyond our walls, and Millennials, the generation of 18-34 year olds who often reject mainstream religion.

And so we need to continue to reach out to other groups in Branford, to the Fire Department and the Libraries, to AA groups and to the Girl Scouts and the Boy Scouts, to learn what the dreams and needs of our neighbors are.

And, we need to reach out to Millennials, who may consider themselves to be "spiritual but not religious," but who share our passion for community service and who want to be part of something bigger than themselves.

As we have these conversations, we can look for strategic partnerships that can enable us to

reach beyond what our own resources permit to create lifealtering solutions to problems. And as we work with our neighbors, we will build relationships with them and our lives will become interwoven. As Bishop Ian said, "It is through collective stories of community that we begin to feel a sense of how God is moving in and amongst us and the people of Branford."

Frederick Buechner wrote, "The place God calls you to is the place where your deep gladness and the world's deep hunger meet." Buechner was speaking of individuals, but the same is true of communities. We need to identify those places where Trinity's deep gladness and the world's deep hunger meet. What we do best can be our strength into the future, and the Holy Spirit will be our guide.



Please help us to listen to discern where God is calling us as a community. Everyone can be part of this project to **be** the church—to build meaningful community—outside of Trinity's walls. What connections do you have? Would you like to join a community conversation? Please reach out to Rev. Sharon, the Wardens, or any Vestry members. Only through connection and conver-

sation can we move forward together.

Buildings & Grounds Ministry

We continue to welcome new groups to share our space. Connecticut Advocate for Parkinsons (CAP) offers Tai Chi, and Dancing with Parkinsons (DwP), through the Neighborhood Music School, New Haven, are the newest members of our community users. In addition to consolidating babies/toddlers/children's play programs into space contiguous with the Godly Play Worship Center, nearby Jen Zehler may be found in the Center for Children's Spirituality office in what was the donations collection room.

Needless to say, we have been forced to improve the efficiency of every inch of space! We spent the summer consolidating or throwing out accumulated (and ridiculously old) "stuff", to make room for ongoing space and storage needs. The last of the musty, nasty downstairs carpet has been removed, replaced with inexpensive but durable sheet flooring, thanks to the Foote Grant, which turns inhospitable space into usable space, and will make do until the permanent renovation can be accomplished. As a result, breakout spaces for the community groups are clean and more flexible.

Annual Foote Grant

Under the 2015 Probate Court revised administration of the Foote Family Charitable Trust (FFCT), for the first time this year, Trinity received \$73,000 from FFCT to fund a specific subset of projects from our Master Capital Improvements list. (Previously, FFCT had awarded Trinity \$15,000 annually as operating income. That ended with this new plan, approved by the Probate Court Judge.) The award will vary year-to-year.

Beginning this November, and then every year, Trinity must submit a full report on the status of the currently funded projects, and also make a full Grant Application for the next years' award. The Trustees award about \$350,000 annually among the beneficiaries, of which Foote Park is primary, then Zion and Trinity, and then several other Town programs. Annually, Vestry will weigh our competing priorities on the Master Capital Improvements list, which includes Church/Parish Hall/Parish House and Rectory buildings, and potentially pieces of the Lower Level renovation, if not covered by other grants. Items are approved at the discretion of the Foote Committee.

Lower Level Renovation

The Lower Level Steering Committee continues to meet every two weeks, working with architect Tony Terry to complete a feasibility study for the renovation of the Undercroft, kitchen, and all the contiguous space, including the choir area underneath the Parish Hall. Tony is meeting with primary users of all these spaces to determine needs for the future. Design improvements have to incorporate flexible, multi-user space, support modern technology and media, be aesthetically light and pleasing, and easy to maintain.

The biggest challenge of the project is fitting an elevator, and fire -rated stairs, and a wheelchair ramp terminus into the "open" stairwell area inside the Parish Hall doors. This has been studied exhaustively in the past, with no way forward being found, and again as a "must-have" for this project. It's final - all three needs will not meet modern building code requirements in that space. But modern technology now offers an elevator that will leave room for the fire-rated stairs, but not a terminus for a wheelchair access ramp. But, a stair lift in the entrance lobby will allow people using walkers or canes to ascend the 3 steps from street level to parish hall-sanctuary level. Therefore, wheelchair visitors will continue to use the ramp access to the church, connect on the same level to the elevator at the Parish Hall foyer, and enjoy the programs in the Undercroft. Together at last! This is progress given the very real challenge of a historicallyprotected building.

Tony brought in structural and mechanical engineers to examine what's causing our downstairs water/mold issues, the fix and its cost, as well as the cost of asbestos removal. These environmental abatement issues have to be resolved before the actual renovation work can begin. The cost will be almost \$100,000. We are actively searching for an experienced grant writer, and grants to apply for to enable these projects, in addition to grants for the renovation.

Tony and I have presented two updates to Vestry—one on the interior space improvements, and the other an optional exterior visionary idea suggested by Tony, to incorporate a new and distinct entry to general use space. This would create an inviting presence on the Green, with improved landscaping, and signage. In addition to the entry, the Parish Hall itself would be upgraded for more public and parish events including sound attenuation, air conditioning, audio-visual capability and coat storage.
