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Dear Trinity Friends,

For the last few years, the Episcopal Church has been on a journey into the future via a long ago past. Jesus began a movement when he sent his fol-

lowers out, two by two, into the world, without so much as an extra cloak. He just told them to go and be with whatever community they found. They were to go and be the presence of Christ in town centers, coffee houses, train stations, and living rooms. They weren't supposed to invite people to church (which didn't even exist then) or get people to believe in anything except peace and love. Jesus expected them to go and be the Kingdom for those they encountered.

Somewhere along the line, the church happened and people were expected to come and fill the pews. The culture helped with that. But, not anymore. We who are the church must admit that old model isn't working as well, if at all. Thanks be to God that we are a part of The Episcopal Church, which is being wise at this time. At the national level and here in Connecticut, we are looking to the original model - going out into the community and learning from it what God is doing in our neighborhoods. We are being challenged to move from being "the church" to being participants in God's mission.

Your Vestry, Wardens, the Council Chairs

and I, are in learning mode about how we best navigate through this change. First step is The Rev. Canon Timothy Hodapp, Canon for Mission Collaboration at the Episcopal Church in CT (ECCT), will meet with us this week to start the process.

ECCT has made significant changes in its structure and budget as a part of TREC-CT. As we are all called to enter into this new thing, Bps. Douglas and Ahrens want the CT clergy to have support and training in this new way of being God's people. I am gratified that I have been chosen to participate in a four-day workshop/training in Cambridge, MA, in April, that is helping leaders prepare for this shift. It is exciting.

I know something about being unable to resist God's call. That call is no longer just for ordained leadership but for all of us. God has already figured out where we are going. It's up to us to listen, discern, and choose.

ity and had a great affection for Zion.

Up to this point, Trinity has received an annual modest disbursement (\$15,000) from the trust. That amount has gone into our general operating budget and we were grateful for it. The transfer of ownership of the park creates a whole new circumstance for Trinity and future disbursements. The trust, which will maintain assets of around \$11 million, will continue to support the maintenance of Foote Park and begin to make much more significant disbursements to both of the churches. If the town accepts the transfer of the Foote Park properties, we will receive a \$73,000 distribution in 2016 to be applied to a long list of capital projects here in our expensive, historic buildings. That list includes the restoration of our oldest Tiffany window, necessary repairs to the organ, flooring and mold abatement, replacement of the deteriorating red doors into the Parish Hall, and several other repairs.



What this will mean for Trinity's budget is we need to replace the \$15,000 (5% of our revenue). Capital needs have never been funded from our annual budget, we have worked hard to manage our small endowment to stay up with needs,

and been able to borrow from diocesan funds when needed. It will still take \$1,000 a day to maintain the ministry, programs, and the staff of this parish. The trustees of the Foote Trust are clear that they will not fund our operations. The blessing for us is that we will be able to manage our building needs and keep this historic treasure in good shape into the future for generations to come. Hallelujah!

Report From Annual Convention

Jim Atkinson and Dave Smith, Trinity's Diocesan Delegates, attended the 231st ECCT Annual Convention along with Sharon. We thank them both for using their time on Trinity's behalf, and for filing reports.

Jim advised that most of the activity was focused on the work of TREC-CT, and the proposed restructuring of the diocese to better fulfill God's Mission. Details are still being worked out on the structure that will supplant the Deanery system (the grouping of churches for collaboration). Some changes have already taken place to reduce expense, like moving "the money pit" Diocesan

House to the more cost-effective Meriden facility, and some staff changes. Work is ongoing to make liturgy less gender -specific, but no change is expected in dogma or doctrine.

Dave's report summarizes the 12 resolutions, the voting status, and the impact on Trinity. His entire report is an addendum to this newsletter.

Christmas Survey Findings

There were 88 responses to the survey, which is a 38% representation of the active membership. As surveys go, that's a strong participation rate. Thank you! The survey verified our worship services are set at the best time for most people, so there is no change in the traditional times of early Christmas Eve 5:00 PM and 10:30 (Concert) with late service at 11:00 PM and Christmas Day 10:00 AM. More people attend the late service than the other two, and include the concert as part of their tradition. One-third of respondents are out of town or attend service elsewhere.

Violence as a Norm

I can say with adequate conviction that kids my age - the ones raised primarily in a post 9/11 world - have become desensitized to violence and terrorism.

The ironic side effect of such desensitization is that we actually think about violence and terrorism much more; the fact that it seems so normal means we

think about it without the pretense of isolation and novelty that must have once accompanied it. "All my friends think ISIS is attacking when we hear a plane," Trinity parishioner Lauren Elmasry joked once. But the fear is real. Thirty years ago, terror attacks weren't so commonplace in the news that they could earn the title of the "latest."

Similarly, when a woman with mental health issues disrupted a Trinity service several months ago, there was a shared thought among the youth in the church: "This is going to be the next mass shooting." These are kids who live just miles away from Newtown, who have heard in the news and in political discourse about the role of mental health in the actions of mass murderers. They're kids who live in a time when church sermons almost regularly cover mass violence, because it happens so frequently. "I am tired," Rev. Sharon once said, of preparing another sermon after a mass shooting. These are kids who, instead of considering a crime and inferring a cause, see a "cause" and infer a crime. Because it's become a theme.

Youth

One, then, must wonder: will an increased occurrence of violence provoke any more action from those youth who hear about it? Or will we become gradually less urgent in our response, as each successive death blends into the rest and becomes one more drop in the storm we've grown to accept?

History of the Church Organs

Thanks to Gabe Simerson, we now have a written history of the church's organs, dating to the 1890s when the first one was built for Trinity.

Gabe, 17, a pianist who now studies playing the organ with Simon

Jacobs, Organist at St. Thomas's Church, New Haven, felt that since the organ is so central to our worship its history should be documented. "I was reading the First Congregational Church's website and thought that if they have an entire online page dedicated to their



organ, there's no reason why we shouldn't, and I'd love to do it."

So Gabe researched the church archives and wrote "The History and Description of the Organs of Trinity Church, Branford."

"We were lacking the story of a very important part of our worship and I thought I was the guy to do it. I discussed the idea with the Rev. Sharon and she said, 'Go for it.' "

Gabe, who goes to Hamden Hall Country Day School Hamden, also sings in the choir, rings the bell for worship, is a lector, and feature writer in *Messenger* as the voice for our youth. He hopes that the organ history will be added to church website and printed copies made available. (Coming soon!)

Some members may also remember Sandra's mother, Helen Aubrey, who was a longtime parishioner until her death in 2011. "Mom was a special lady," added Sandra. Although they now attend Union Baptist Church in downtown Mystic, because that's where the grandchildren go, Sandra has strong roots in the Episcopal Church. "I'm very thankful that Trinity is still there, and I'm really looking forward to attending."

Liz and another teacher, Jennifer, plan to schedule classes in the Youth Room on Wednesday and Saturday mornings, beginning in January.

Vestry

The basic responsibilities of the Vestry are to define and articulate the Vision; to support God's mission by word and deed; to focus on strategic issues and new initiatives; to uphold a fiduciary responsibility for the Parish; and to select the rector when needed.

Officers are elected for one-year terms. Vestry members are elected for three-year terms. Each year, three of the nine vestry positions change. Vestry meets once a month on the third Tuesday, except July. Meetings generally last for two hours.

- Clear a background check, confidentially handled by the Rector.
